From Visualization to Production

Ron Pauly, designer and model maker in the research and development division of Tonka Corporation for some 18 years, will give a presentation about Tonka's toy design process as part of the Dunn County Historical Society's "Tonka Treasures" exhibit.

Pauly will describe how the company developed toy designs and how those designs progressed from ideas to actual products. He will stress the importance for designers to visualize in order to accurately design.

Pauly will display a sheet metal toy he made just for fun while he was a student — a project which ultimately secured his job at Tonka. Pauly briefly attended Stout State College in 1960-61 at the encouragement of his high school industrial arts teacher, who graduated from Stout. He transferred to Dunwoody Institute.
