Announcing New Waterloo Rural Schools Book

The Waterloo Area Historical Society announces the debut of a new book on rural schools. Members Ron Giese, Mikki Dempsey, Maureen Giese, Lucy Hanson and Kathy Lawrence have worked for eight months collecting and documenting information.

Over 40 area people contributed pictures and stories. The nostalgic result is a book of 104 pages with details on 21 former one-room schools in the Waterloo area – from Abendroth to Youker.*

Most school districts started in the 1840s and 1850s and continued until

consolidation. The book is lavishly illustrated and refers to names of 1600 former students, teachers and officers.

The schools book will be available during the society's holiday sale at Building 129 North Monroe, former Coffee Station on Saturday, December 6th, from 10 am until 4 pm, just in time for holiday gifts.

schools that furnished students to Waterloo High School before consolidation.
